"When Jesus spoke about God, he always spoke about God as being where and when we are...God is not someone who was or will be, but the one who is, and who is for me in the present moment," writes Henri Nouwen. God is where we are; this season of Lent is about remembering the One who walked the way of suffering with us. God is present in the here and now, inviting us to a new way of being and thinking and doing in this season.

The God who is Relationship- Creator, Son, and Spirit- has not ceased being that in this season, and though we must invent new ways of being in human relationship, we will endeavor to do all we can to foster real human connection through this isolating and anxious time. For Sunday, March 22, 2020: The Fourth Sunday in Lent

Collect of the Day

Gracious Father, whose blessed Son Jesus Christ came down from heaven to be the true bread which gives life to the world: Evermore give us this bread, that he may live in us, and we in him; who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

This Sunday, March 22, Bishop Sean, Dean Melinda, and Parish Associate Craig Dressler will be offering worship online. We will send an email directing you where to find the online service. Additionally, we will be posting other kinds of worship material to Facebook and a variety of resources can be found on our website. The Cathedral also has a YouTube Channel and we will be uploading videos occasionally.

While we are not meeting in person regularly, we would urge you to continue giving to the Cathedral through our online giving program. Many of you already give this way, but if this is not your habit, we encourage you to explore this option. We want to be able to meet our bills, address any new issues arising from current circumstances, and pay our staff during this time, so we appreciate your continued generosity.

Compline is the final Office or set of prayers at the end of the day. We pray for protection and peace through the night. A few singers from the Cathedral Choir recorded a Lenten Compline service in our Chapel. The full service will be available soon, but here is the *Nunc dimittis* or *Song of Simeon*, with the following antiphon surrounding it: Guide us waking, O Lord, and guard us sleeping; that awake we may watch with Christ, and asleep we may rest in peace. 
